RIVERSIDE COMMUNITY PUTS ON PICNIC FOR TEAM MARCH

MARCH AIR RESERVE BASE, Calif. – For five decades, the Inland Empire community has come together to serve those who serve. On Saturday, Sept. 13, the Military First Committee will host the 50th Annual March Air Reserve Base Community Picnic at LeMay Park, continuing a tradition that began in 1974.

"This is the 50th year, and for me, it's the 37th year I've been doing this," said Jamil Dada, chair of the picnic and Military First Committee. "Your service deserves our service—and that's why we do this."

The one-day event is expected to draw between 3,500 and 5,000 attendees, including Airmen, Soldiers, Sailors, Marines, and their families. More than 300 volunteers—many of them local civic leaders, business representatives, and residents—will donate their time to prepare food, run games, and staff booths.

"We've never had a problem gathering volunteers. In fact, we often have to turn people away because everyone wants to support our military," Dada said. "It's incredible to see both sides—service members and volunteers—beaming with joy. Everyone feels the connection."



The picnic traditionally features a carnival-like atmosphere with face painting, jump houses, a dunk tank, live music, and free food and drinks for Team March members and their families. Local businesses contribute both funds and food, with Albertsons/Vons/Pavilions serving as the largest annual sponsor.

"We could not do this event without the support of Albertsons and the many local businesses that step up year after year," Dada said.

Nicholas Adcock, President and CEO of the Greater Riverside Chambers of Commerce, emphasized the Chamber's commitment to March ARB and its people.

'The Chamber's Military Affairs Council has always been proud to spend a day sharing our gratitude for the men and women who serve on Team March," Adcock said. "These servicemembers sacrifice themselves, their livelihoods, and their families to ensure that communities like Riverside, Moreno Valley, and Perris can feel safe and free to live. The picnic also underscores that we can work together as servicemembers and civilians to build bonds of friendship and camaraderie. That is why we have been hosting this lunch for more than 40 years. It truly is a wonderful opportunity to 'serve those who serve us.'"

For Dada, who also serves as an Air Force civic leader for Air Mobility Command and U.S. Air Force Reserve Command, the event represents the unique bond between March ARB and the surrounding community.

"This whole region is veteran-friendly, largely because of March," he said. "Our citizens feel secure knowing there's an active Air Force base here, and they want to give back. The picnic is how we show our gratitude."

This year marks a milestone—half a century of volunteers, businesses, and civic leaders working hand-in-hand with March ARB to celebrate the men and women who wear the uniform.



"I leave the picnic energized, not exhausted," Dada said. "My hope is that this tradition continues for another 50 years."

MARCH ARB STRENGTHENS RESERVE RESOURCES THROUGH ACTIVE DUTY PARTNERSHIPS

MARCH AIR RESERVE BASE, Calif.— The Military & Family Readiness Office (MFRO) at March Air Reserve Base has a big mission: to support Reserve Airmen and their families from enlistment to retirement, despite limited on-site resources. That mission just got stronger thanks to new partnerships with nearby active duty bases Camp Pendleton and Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Miramar.



Military life doesn't come with a handbook

-- but it does come with stress, change, and a constant need to adapt. For Reserve members, that challenge can be magnified when many of the traditional support systems, like financial counselors or on-base libraries, aren't available. Recognizing that gap, MFRO staff visited regional Navy and Marine Corps installations to build bridges, share resources, and expand their reach for the Total Force.

"We know we can't do it all in-house," said MSgt Kristopher "Motivate" Davidson, Airman & Family Readiness NCOIC. "But that doesn't stop us from making sure our Reserve Airmen have access to what they need. These partnerships are about finding ways to be better — together."

During their visits, the MFRO staff linked up with personal financial counselors (PFCs) at Camp Pendleton, established contacts for virtual education events, and explored morale-building hubs like 3D print labs, book clubs, and even innovation spaces available to active duty personnel.

"We don't have a dedicated PFC here at March right now, but by partnering with Pendleton and Miramar, our members can still connect virtually and get financial education and support," Davidson added. "We also learned about creative wellness spaces and libraries that give Airmen a much-needed break from the daily grind — that's something we hope to bring to our own base in the future."

MFRO's programs are designed to be more than a handout, from the March Field Food Security Program, to the Bundles for Babies, and programs like Air Force Aid assistance, are designed to meet Airmen where they are — even when resources are tight. Programs offer everything from \$150 Zelle payments for new parents attending workshops to referral support for special medical or dependent needs.

"This isn't my office," said Mrs. Briarly S. Wilson, Director of the Military & Family Readiness Office. "This is the members' office. We're here to serve and if we don't have what you need in-house, we will do our best to find it and connect you to it.

Whether it's career counseling, emergency support, or guidance through life transitions, we're your constant from enlistment to retirement."

From working with Navy counterparts on exceptional family member referrals to coordinating access to job fairs and TAP (Transition Assistance Program) resources, the team at March is focused on building a web of support that doesn't stop at the base gates.

While some active duty installations have more robust support structures and staffing, many Reserve members still commute long distances or live in surrounding communities like Temecula and Murrieta. By fostering inter-base collaboration, MFRO is ensuring that these Airmen — and their families — don't fall through the cracks.

"We're all military," Davidson said. "Whether you're Reserve, Guard, or Active, we should be lifting each other up. It's about sharing knowledge and making sure everyone has what they need to thrive."

9/11 REMEMBRANCE

MARCH AIR RESERVE BASE, Calif. – Team March gathered at Fire Station 1 on Sept. 11, 2025, to honor the lives lost during the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, with a solemn remembrance ceremony led by the March Fire Department.

The ceremony began with a formal welcome from the fire department and an invocation, setting a solemn tone as attendees bowed their heads in prayer.

Installation Fire Chief Kile Stewart reflected on the significance of the memorial, both personally and for the fire service community.



"As a member of Generation X, 9/11 is one of the defining moments of my life," Stewart said. "I remember watching the events unfold while on duty in Okinawa. Like many firefighters and service members, my first thought was, 'Where can I go to help?' What stood out most, though, was the unity that followed. The country came together as one, setting aside differences to move forward as Americans."

This year, Fire Engineer Jesús Osorio rang the ceremonial bell, symbolizing respect and remembrance for the 343 firefighters who lost their lives responding to the World Trade Center.

"To me, it means a sense of commitment to the 343 firefighters who passed away on 9/11," Osorio said. "I was only 8 years old when it happened, but it stuck with me. Now it's an honor to be able to do this for them."

Airmen, civilians, and local community members in attendance joined together to pay their respects, reinforcing the enduring bond between the fire service and the military community.

Col. Bryan Bailey, 452nd Air Mobility Wing commander, emphasized the importance of carrying forward the memory of 9/11.

"Today we honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice on that tragic day," Bailey said. "This remembrance is more than a ceremony—it is a commitment to never forget, to recognize how that day reshaped our nation, and to ensure that we remain ready to defend freedom for future generations."

As the ceremony concluded, March ARB leaders and firefighters emphasized the importance of preserving these traditions to ensure that new generations of Airmen understand the legacy of service, sacrifice, and unity born out of that day.

452ND CIVIL ENGINEERS KEEP AIRFIELD SAFE, MISSION-READY

MARCH AIR RESERVE BASE, Calif. — With shovels, skid steers and determination, the 452nd Civil Engineering Squadron is clearing overdue trenches on March Air Reserve Base's flight line — a critical project that blends mission readiness with hands-on training.

"This trench was for maintenance," said Staff Sgt. Elvis Lara, a heavy machinery and concrete specialist with the 452 CES. "It's collected vegetation and water, attracting birds right near the airfield. We're clearing it out to make the airfield safer and reduce the risk of bird strikes."

Operating heavy equipment in such a sensitive location requires extensive planning and teamwork.

"You can't just show up and start digging," said Tech. Sgt. Marvin Casillas, the project's noncommissioned officer in charge. "We had to coordinate with environmental management, get digging permits, and make sure we were cleared to work so close to flight operations. Planning is often more challenging than the work itself."





For the Airmen, the project is as much about readiness as it is about infrastructure.

"This gives us the real-world, hands-on experience we need," said Staff Sgt. Israel Berber, a pavements and equipment specialist. "Most of us don't operate this kind of machinery in our civilian jobs. Being here and running equipment helps us prepare for deployments when lives and missions depend on us knowing exactly what we're doing."

The team is utilizing a variety of equipment, including excavators, dump trucks and compact track loaders. Berber emphasized the importance of mastering every type of machine.

"The more experience you have with different equipment, the better you are in the field," he said. "It's not as easy as it looks. You have to feel the machine, know how it responds, and be able to adjust instantly."

The squadron expects the project to conclude later this month, but its value goes beyond a clear trench.

"When you see the progress you've made, it feels good," Casillas said. "It's not just about moving dirt — it's about protecting aircraft, preparing for deployment, and keeping March mission-ready."

IT TAKES A VILLAGE: HOW ONE AIRMAN TURNED GRIEF INTO A MOVEMENT UPLIFTING AN ENTIRE COMMUNITY

In the heart of California's Inland Empire, over 160 families are part of a growing movement—one that goes beyond wins and losses. It's a story built on personal tragedy, fueled by purpose, and sustained by a community that believes in something greater. At the center of it all are two programs changing the landscape of youth sports: Relentless Premier Athletes and Empire Sports Academy

Everything changed in December 2021 for MSgt Rodell Martinez, a member of the 452nd Operations Support Squadron and proud Inland Empire father. That month, he lost his wife, U.S. Navy LTJG. Ivy Quintana-Martinez, who previously served with the 452nd



Aeromedical Staging Squadron at March Air Reserve Base—the very place they first met back in 2007. "We did everything together," he says. "When she passed, I was completely lost. I had to stay busy, or I would fall apart."

That need for purpose led him to volunteer with a local youth football program. But what should have been a healing outlet turned into something frustrating and disheartening. The season was plagued with disorganization, missing gear, and whispers of mismanagement. "It hurt to see the kids and families caught in it," he recalls. "It was chaos."

One day, he shared a simple but powerful idea with Head Coach Mike Page: "In seven years, I need a program for my newborn son to play in—without the drama, without failed leadership." And that was how the seed was planted. A new kind of program, built on fairness, integrity, and community, was on its way.



By the end of 2022, that idea became reality. A five-member board was formed, each with equal voice and vote, and the work began—reaching out to schools, cities, and community leaders to secure practice and game fields. Murrieta Mesa High School became home base. By 2023, Relentless Premier Athletes was up and running—and they made their presence known in a big way, winning two state championships and a national title in their very first season.

However, the real win wasn't in the trophies. Families from as far as Victorville, San Bernardino, and Moreno Valley started driving to be part of what was happening. "We built more than a football team—we built a standard," he says. "A place where kids are coached to be better athletes, but more importantly, better people."

Even with more than 200 hours a season devoted to coaching and serving on the board, he still felt there was more to give. That's when Empire Sports Academy came to life. The roots of it go back to the pandemic, when he started a neighborhood workout group just to keep kids active and connected. Now, that energy lives on in a full-scale sports performance academy, focused on developing athletes physically, mentally, and emotionally.

"We train with heart," he says. "It's not about being perfect. If a kid shows up and gives effort, I'll give them everything I've got." Empire Sports Academy provides mentorship, strength and conditioning, agility work, and a strong focus on total growth—designed for athletes from all sports and backgrounds.

For parents navigating youth sports, he offers some heartfelt advice: trust the coaches, be present, and support your child. "These coaches volunteer countless hours. And if there's a cheat code to help your kid get stronger, faster, and more confident, why not take it? Just 3–5 hours a week of training can be life-changing."

This year, MSgt Martinez steps into a new role as the Head Coach for the 7U team. His youngest son is now three, and he's already picturing the day he hands him off to a trusted coach in the very program he helped build from the ground up.

As for Empire Sports Academy, the vision is big. It's about more than sports. It's about creating a hub for the entire Inland Empire—where young athletes train, grow, and become the best version of themselves. "One day, I want to see a kid on national TV say, 'I trained at Empire.' That's the dream."

Reflecting on the journey, he's filled with gratitude. "This experience has brought so many amazing people into my life, and I've learned something from every one of them. To my family —thank you for standing by me. To our Relentless and Empire families, thank you for trusting us with your children."

And to those who helped build it all:

"Senior"—thank you for showing me what leadership looks like.

Mike-we did this together.

Corina-you're the backbone of both programs.

Chad-thank you for believing.

To Darris, Hugo, Tony, Doug, K, Mark, Real Results, and all the volunteer coaches—not just ours, but in every program—thank you.

It truly takes a village to change the world.

Based in Murrieta, California, Relentless Premier Athletes kicks off its season in September, with practices already underway three days a week. The program is currently welcoming new players, with roster spots available in the 7U, 8U, and 12U divisions. Enrollment is also open for Empire Sports Academy's August 2026 session, based in Temecula, California.

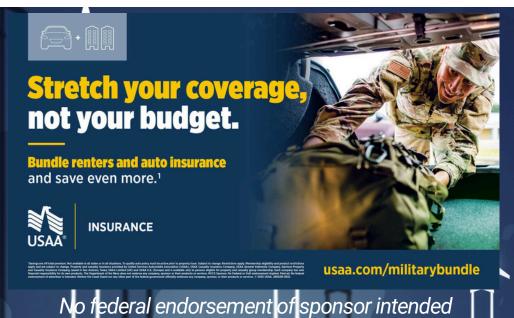
