A NEW ERA OF ENLISTED LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

AIRPOWER

PURPOSE

The Airpower Leadership Academy (ALA) is a formalized mentorship program that targets select Staff Sergeants and Technical Sergeants, from the 452nd Air Mobility Wing. During this course, Non-commissioned Officers discover and articulate their understanding to the five pillars of ALA:

- · Relationships
- Expectations
- Academics
- Character
- · Health

These five pillars, R-E-A-C-H, have been developed by the ALA cadre to articulate the perspective that one has to *REACH* in order to be a successful leader. As an action verb, the mnemonic *REACH* conveys that leadership is not a passive "let it happen" attribute; rather one that demands a focused and deliberate approach to deliberately develop sustainable leadership qualities.





LEADERSHIP

SELECTION

The inaugural students are hand-selected by squadron superintendents from across the Wing, subsequent students are handpicked by alumni and vetted through their leadership team. This unique, but proven approach, breaks down barriers by empowering alumni to communicate the benefits of attending ALA to prospective students.

Once students are vetted and selected for attendance, personalized invitations are delivered to each potential student. Although each class is valuable and offers a wealth of information, attendance is absolutely voluntary—no pressure is placed on students to attend.

Each class is comprised of approximately 10 - 20 students. This ideal class size provides the perfect blend of maximizing return on in-vestment while providing students a more intimate learning environment. Airmen provide feedback throughout the course to facilitate future course development.



Artificial Intelligence (AI) has been around for decades, but new advancements have brought the technology to the forefront. AI made a generational leap forward in 2020 with a large language model (LLM) GPT-3, created by OpenAI. GPT-3 could solve high-school-level math problems as well as create computer programs. In 2022, OpenAI used the foundation of GPT-3 to then create and release the generative AI chatbot ChatGPT. This new LLM almost immediately disturbed academics, journalists, and various others because it was impossible to distinguish human writing from ChatGPT-generated writing.

In 2023, the field of artificial intelligence witnessed a significant transformation driven by remarkable progress in LLMs. Al technology showcased abilities in healthcare and education to creative arts and political discourse.

2023 showcased AI models that matched or surpassed human performance in intricate tasks, such as answering complex medical exam questions, generating persuasive political messages, and even choreographing human dance animations to match diverse pieces of music. Growing international adoption of AI technology and software could reshape the global balance of power and potentially have dramatic geopolitical consequences.





Al has no single definition, but it generally refers to the ability of computers to perform tasks traditionally associated with human capabilities. Generative Al models draw from massive amounts of training data to generate statistically probable outcomes in response to specific prompts.

Tools powered by such models generate humanlike text, images, audio, and other content. Another commonly referenced form of AI, known as artificial general intelligence (AGI), or "strong" AI, refers to systems that would learn and apply knowledge like humans do. However, these systems do not yet exist, and experts disagree on what exactly they would entail.

In the countries that invest the most in AI, development has historically relied on public funding. In China, AI research is predominantly funded by the government, while the United States drew on research by the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) and other federal agencies for decades. In recent years, U.S. AI development has largely shifted to the private sector, which has poured hundreds of billions of dollars into the effort.

Many experts have framed AI development as a struggle for technological primacy between the U.S. and China. The winner of that competition, they say, will gain both economic and geopolitical advantage.





In 2022, President Biden banned exports of the most powerful semiconductors to China and encouraged U.S. allies to do the same, citing national security concerns. One year later, President Biden proposed an outright ban on several streams of U.S. investment into China's AI sector, and the Department of Commerce announced a raft of new restrictions aimed at curbing Chinese "breakthroughs in artificial intelligence." Most experts believe the U.S. has outpaced China in AI development to date, but that China will quickly close the gap.

Advancements in AI technologies have compelled the national security sector to evolve rapidly in response to the new capacities these innovations offer. Advances in AI will affect national security by driving change in three areas: military superiority, information superiority, and economic prosperity. The Department of Defense expects AI technology to transform "the very character of war" by empowering autonomous weapons and improving strategic analysis.

In Ukraine's war against Russia, Kyiv is deploying autonomously operated AI-powered drones, marking it the first time a major conflict has involved such technology. Warring parties could also soon rely on AI systems to accelerate battlefield decisions or to automatically attack enemy infrastructure. Some experts fear these capabilities could raise the possibility of nuclear weapons use. In recent years, AI has emerged as a potent tool in the hands of terrorist groups, used to refine their tactics to radicalize individuals, recruit them, and plan terrorist attacks.





This presents formidable challenges to national security professionals in their efforts to anticipate and counter these Aldriven threats effectively. There is also the potential to use Al for grooming purposes, specifically the targeting, manipulating, and radicalizing of individuals to get them to support or participate in acts of terrorism.

Al algorithms, particularly on social media, can meticulously analyze users' data to identify vulnerable individuals. For example, an algorithm may flag someone who frequently engages with extremist content or displays susceptibility to certain ideologies. These algorithms can then target those individuals with tailored messaging and gradually steer them toward extremist views.

Furthermore, AI could heighten the twin threats of disinformation and propaganda, issues that are gaining relevance as the world just entered a year in which more people are set to vote than ever before: more than seventy countries, representing half the global population, will hold national elections in 2024.

Generative AI tools are making deep fakes easier to create, and the technology is already appearing in electoral campaigns across the globe. Experts also cite the possibility that bad actors could use AI to create sophisticated phishing attempts that are tailored to a target's interests to gain access to election systems.

C-17 ELEPHANT WALK AT MARCH AIR RESERVE BASE

MARCH AIR RESERVE BASE (Dec. 9, 2023) --- An elephant walk is what the 729th Airlift Squadron at March Air Reserve Base, California, demonstrated with five C-17 Globemaster III heavy cargo aircraft preceding a minimum interval of takeoff (MITO), which can facilitate rapidly launching a sortie surge of planes for a mass deployment event.

The elephant walk got its name in World War II when massive fleets of American aircraft were launched as quickly as possible in close timing and proximity. It refers specifically to the moving formation of a large group of (mostly colored grey) military aircraft or smaller groups of extremely large aircraft, such as the 729th's C-17 fleet of heavy lifters.

U.S. Air Force Major Jon R. Millman, chief of group tactics, 452 Operations Group said, "It's a unique opportunity to have C-17's launch all at the same time to allow us to practice different threat reactions and mission sets--flying in close proximity and adapting to the challenges of putting that many C-17s in the air at one time."

To put one C-17 mission in the air requires the efforts of a lot of Airmen, with a dozen in the maintenance teams and aircrew scrambling to get the aircraft loaded and in the air. It's much harder to manage the amount of manpower required to coordinate so many launches in a brief sequence. "The training, the coordination, and most importantly, the execution is a unique opportunity that will prepare us for the next fight."

The mission of the Squadron ranges from humanitarian cargo, moving personnel, aeromedical evacuation, and sustainment. Millman said that these types of practice scenarios can help prepare crews to fly and return while completing those missions in a contested environment. He said that this is the type of training that truly gets the squadron ready for any mission where fast mass deployment is a requirement for success.

But, before the plane's takeoff, the elephant walked. Comprised of 5 C-17 aircraft, this elephant walk was truly a sight to behold at March Air Reserve Base as the massive planes taxied in unison together towards the runway to leave in succession.

After a brief stop at Edwards Air Force Base, all of the aircraft returned at the end of the successful training mission.

"This is such a wonderful training opportunity," said Millman, "The United States is unique in its capability of rapid global mobility anywhere in the world, and that's something you need to maintain and train. We're very thankful for the opportunity to demonstrate what we're capable of because when something like this comes together and works, it's just astounding."
