SPOTLIGHT: 336TH AIR REFUELING SQUADRON

The 452nd recently welcomed home members of the 336th ARS, 752nd AMXS, 452nd MXS, 452nd OSS, and even a special 912th ARS guest star from the wing's first KC-135 tasking under the AFFORGEN model. Having sent aircraft and crews downrange for over two decades in the mighty Stratotanker, we are accustomed to the extensive preparation that accompanies deployment readiness. However, this round presented unique preparation challenges with new and extensive Ready Airman Training and flying training requirements. Nevertheless, we persevered, delivering a total package of aircraft, aircrew, maintenance, and staff in late January.

While downrange, our 452nd members supported the JFACC's requirements for Operations Inherent Resolve, Poseidon Archer, Prosperity Guardian, and Exercise Accurate Test. By providing air refueling capabilities throughout the AOR, our members directly enabled antipirating efforts and military strikes, facilitated partner nation integration training efforts, and worked with coalition partners in efforts to increase regional stability.

Our 336 th aircrews included many highly experienced crewmembers however, this was also an opportunity for many of our newer Aircraft Commanders, Copilots, and Boom Operators to experience a dynamically complex, demanding operational environment. This was particularly highlighted on the global level during the latter half of the deployment that coincided with the escalation of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Our crews encountered countless emergencies on almost every aircraft system – from boom malfunctions and flight control issues to fuel leaks and loss of all navigational systems. Despite those emergencies, regional airspace challenges, and increasing area threats, our crews executed 288 sorties, flying 1972 hours, providing 7.3 million pounds of air refueling support to over 600 receivers. This remarkable mission execution was made possible by our maintainers and support staff on the ground. Combined, this deployment again proved the 452ND and AMW's ability to generate combat airpower worldwide.

Finally, the entire deployment – from lead-up training activities to getting our members out the door and the warm reception they received upon return – is a stellar example of Team March. Nearly every base agency was involved in training and processing deployers, and we want to extend our deepest gratitude, especially to the following who went above and beyond to assist: Security Forces providing additional small arms training, the clinic for pre- and post-deployment screenings, IPR for efficient inand out-processing, LRS vehicle operations contractors for reception transportation support, the 452nd First Sergeant's Council for the assist with our ARS reception, and Tony Decay with his entire USO team for their support to our families, especially the sign-making supplies for the children and dependents. We were also supported by our off-base partners over the weekend – our Ontario and Los Angeles International Airport customs agents. Thank you all for making our mission possible. And to my fellow RRATs, welcome home!!

ASIAN AMERICAN - NATIVE HAWAIIAN - PACIFIC ISLANDER MONTH (AANHPI)



In honor of Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (AANHPI)
Month, we invite you to take a moment to reflect on the invaluable
contributions the AANHPI community has made on American history. For
generations, the AANHPI community has enriched our nation's cultural tapestry
and driven progress in various fields. From laborers who helped build the
transcontinental railroad to activists who passionately fought for civil rights,

AAPI individuals have played pivotal roles in shaping the American story. The activism of leaders like Yuri Kochiyama, who advocated for Japanese American reparations, and Grace Lee Boggs, who fought for racial and gender equality, have left indelible marks on American society. Honoring the culture within the AAPI community is crucial for understanding the complexity of American identities and history. As the nation continues to grow, the voices and contributions of AANHPI individuals remain vital in shaping the future of our success.

This year, we share the story of the only living Asian American Medal of Honor Recipient, Dennis M. Fujii. U.S. Army Specialist Five Dennis M. Fujii displayed extraordinary bravery and selflessness as a helicopter ambulance crew chief during rescue missions in Laos and Vietnam from Feb. 18 to 22, 1971. Despite being injured in a crash and facing relentless enemy fire, Fujii remained on the ground, treating wounded soldiers, and coordinating defenses.

For more than 17 continuous hours, Fujii courageously braved hostile fire, venturing out from his secure position to closely monitor enemy troop movements and coordinate air strikes. Overall, Fujii's actions earned him the award of the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star, Purple Heart, two Air Medals, and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Palm. On July 5, 2022, Fujii was awarded the Medal of Honor.

163D ATTACK WING: DIVERSITY IS AN ASSET: AIRMAN HELPS US, PHILIPPINES RELATIONS 'LEAP' FORWARD DURING COPE THUNDER

BASA AIR BASE, Philippines --

The U.S.-Philippine Alliance, complemented by our various relationships and partnerships in the region, reinforces a regional structure that has been instrumental in maintaining peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific for decades.

Our diverse personnel are a force multiplier for this mission, enabling us to communicate more quickly with our Allies and bridge cultural gaps.

One example is U.S. Air Force Captain Timothy John D. Nolan, a native of the Philippines who loves his country of birth and the United States.

"I was born and raised here, so on a personal level, there's that warm and fuzzy feeling knowing that I'm giving back to both lands I consider home," said Nolan, a Citizen Airmen in the California Air National Guard.

Nolan pursued a way to help both of his counties by becoming a Tagalog interpreter after commissioning and learning about the Language Enabled Airman Program (LEAP). The objective of LEAP is to develop language-enabled, cross-cultural scholars who can operate seamlessly with partner nation military forces and civilians around the world. With these skills, service members can better support the application of air and space power through meeting the National Defense Strategy pillars of strengthening partnerships, interoperability, and adversary understanding.

It took two applications before he was selected as a Tagalog interpreter. Still, afterward, he volunteered as an interpreter for the 11th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) during exercise KAMANDAG 6 in the Philippines.

"The LEAP capability is a true force multiplier and is critical in pursuing strategic objectives in this area of responsibility," said Nolan. "We have daily interactions with our Philippine Air Force (PAF) counterparts, so my comfort with speaking the language and still being in tune with my culture makes all the coordination with the host nation seamless."

Captain Nolan isn't just an interpreter and liaison; he is an MQ-9 Pilot who has volunteered his time to work outside his traditional scope of duties to have a greater impact on the mission. He currently leads the Live-Fly Cell as the deputy officer in charge during Cope Thunder and Balikatan 24 exercises.

"During Cope Thunder, I've had the opportunity to bridge those gaps by talking to the logistics guy and communicating with the driver, trying to tell them to make it a little bit easier for everybody," said Nolan. Everybody here speaks English, but there are certain situations where there's a language barrier, right, and it can inhibit cooperation and coordination because we're not understanding each other."

Recently, Nolan hosted a joint training class for twelve PAF military members. He gave an overview of the Live Fly Cell's mission and taught them entirely in Tagalog how to create a consolidated schedule to ensure maximum situational awareness of the airspace.

This added language capability increased camaraderie and ensured his Philippine Air Force counterparts were equipped to establish processes to support joint operations for future iterations of Cope Thunder and Balikatan.

"This lecture has increased my knowledge of scheduling and my Philippine colleague's knowledge," said PAF Sgt. Ronnel Calalo, training apprentice. "I'm looking forward to it and hope that this type of training continues for others who do not have experience with joint exercises. We know that continuing to conduct this type of bilateral training with the U.S. will greatly impact us all."

"Seeing this grow not only establishes our footprint as key to bridging gaps between language and culture, it also sets the standard for future iterations of events here in this area of responsibility," Nolan added.

In a landscape where communication hurdles have persistently hindered mission success, Nolan's steadfast dedication resonates profoundly as he takes pride in his pivotal role in fortifying the alliance and bolstering regional defenses for both nations.

"The value I've gained is appreciation for seeing our relationship with the host nation flourish," Nolan added. 'The improved collaboration and quality of training enabled by my capability is one of the most important aspects of my responsibility as a LEAP professional. Seeing this grow establishes our footprint as key to bridging gaps between language and culture and sets the standard for future iterations of events here in this area of responsibility."

By harnessing initiatives such as LEAP, the alliance demonstrates a commitment to leveraging diversity as a force multiplier, enabling swift communication, fostering camaraderie, and solidifying the bond between the two nations. This concerted effort not only enhances operational effectiveness, but also serves to safeguard Philippine territory and preserve their lives and livelihood.

The U.S.-Philippine Alliance stands as a cornerstone of regional peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific, bolstered by the diverse array of personnel within its ranks. Through examples like Capt. Timothy Nolan, it becomes evident that diversity is not just a virtue but a strategic asset.
